<u>Creating Mini Arrangements for Meals on</u> <u>Wheels</u>

CGC selected a floral civic project for 2021. The plan is to create tray-size mini floral arrangements to accompany meals for Meals on Wheels patrons. The date and time have not been fully planned out for creating these mini-arrangements yet. I am planting seed for a cutting garden at Jefferson Farm and Gardens to use for this project. I think we will be able to go to the farm, cut the plants and make the arrangements there but that has not been fully flushed out. The mini arrangements include a plastic detergent bottle-top to use as a container, floral foam, and the flowers. We will place each design in a plastic bag for Meals on Wheels staff to

deliver. Especially during the pandemic, this is a wonderful way of bringing the outside world to those who are isolated. PLEASE save those liquid detergent lids. Marie

March Garden Tips

- Clean up flower beds by removing all weeds and dead foliage.
- Tree, shrubs and perennials may be planted as soon as they become available at local nurseries, garden centers and retail stores.
- Fertilize woody plants with a well-balanced fertilizer (12-12-12) before new growth begins, but wait until soil temperatures have warmed. For more information, see MU Guide g6865 Fertilizing Shade Trees https://extensiondata/Pub/pdf/agguides/hort/g06865.pdf.
- Apply dormant oil spray to control scale insects & mites on landscape plants. For more information, see MU Guide g7274 Aphids, Scales and Mites on Home Garden and Landscape Plants https://extensiondata/Pub/pdf/agguides/pests/g07274.pdf.
- Divide and transplant perennials, such as hosta, asters, shasta daisy and daylily.
 Rework beds before replanting, adding organic matter and fertilizer.
- Loosen winter mulch from roses after the danger of frost has passed.
- To help control iris borer and foliage diseases, clean up and destroy the old foliage before new growth begins.
- Prune spring flowering shrubs after bloom.

- Cut back ornamental grasses. For more information, see MU Extension Guide

- Clean up the asparagus bed before new spears emerge: remove weeds, the old, dead stalks of last year's growth and remove any mulch that protected crowns over the winter. For more information, see MU Extension Guide g6405 Growing Asparagus in Missouri https://extension.missouri.edu/g6405.
- Cultivating wet garden soils can destroy soil composition. Delay planting if garden soil is wet. When a ball of soil crumbles easily after being squeezed together in hand, it is dry enough to be safely worked.
- Plant cool season crops such as peas, lettuce, spinach, various greens, radishes, carrots, beets, kohlrabi, turnips, Irish potatoes, and onions outdoors. Set out broccoli, cabbage, brussels sprouts and cauliflower transplants into the garden.

The Columbia Garden Club met by Zoom on February 8, 2021. President Betty Connelly called the meeting to order at 1:10 p.m. with 20 members attending. The original program that was to be presented by Hank Stelzer with MU Extension on properly caring for trees was canceled due to a conflict. Instead, we watched two videos. The first video was on Growing a Greener World, and the second video was about Midwestern Native Plants presented by Drew Lathin. Advantages of having

native plants include: summer heat tolerance, drought resistance, less watering needed as plants have deep root systems, fertilizers not required, providing shelter and food for wildlife and having a healthy living area.

Betty called the business meeting to order at 2:11 p.m. Mary Nesladek gave the inspiration: "Deciding what to grow is one of the most enjoyable aspects of gardening" by Burpee Complete Gardener. Minutes of the previous meeting were approved as distributed. Evette Nissen, treasurer, reported that several bills have been paid and our balance is \$8,627.66. Reminder to save lids from detergent bottles for flower arrangements for Meals on Wheels in June.

Committees: The Plant Sale committee met by Zoom. The plant sale will be on Saturday, April 24 starting at 9 a.m. at Trinity Presbyterian Church, with set up on April 23. Weather permitting, the sale will be outdoors; otherwise, the sale will be indoors with limited number of people allowed inside at a time. Let Betty know if you have any tents to use for the outdoor space. We will have plants from the Amish to sell, and native plants. Members are encouraged to bring their plants from their garden as we make more profit from these. We will also sell donated garden items, but no bake sale due to Covid-19 restrictions. We plan to advertise with signs and a newspaper ad. Details about the plant sale will be sent closer to time.

The Member's Garden Tour will be May 10 and we have four people who have volunteered their yard: Carolyn Doyle, Mary Nesladek, Melissa Kouba, and Betty Connelly. One more yard is needed, and Betty will check with a possible volunteer.

There are usually several native plant sales in the area. Keep an eye out for lists of these and pass on this information.

<u>Clean-Up Columbia</u> will not be an official event this year. However, our Club is going to do a clean-up on April 17 at McKee Street Park, 1900 McKee St (this is off Clark Lane). Janet Lasley is chairman.


May 27 is a Flower Show in Fulton at the Callaway Electric Co-Op building, 1313 Cooperative Dr., Fulton.

"Spice Bush Swallowtail"

Spice bushes host the caterpillar of the spice bush swallowtail. The caterpillar rolls up in the leaves of the spicebush to conceal itself from predators, then comes out to feed at night.
