May Yard of the Month

501 Carpathian Drive stands out on its block for stunning beauty. (This is one of the criteria for nomination as Columbia Garden Club's Yard of the Month.) "A river of blue" comes to mind when looking at the front garden. Thousands of bright blue grape hyacinth swirl in curved masses around the garden's edges. The blue is accented by clumps of pink tulips and hyacinths with a few yellow highlights. At least two dozen shrub roses such as knockout have been pruned to a few inches above the ground and many peonies will also put on a show in a few weeks, as will pink dogwood and fragrant purple lilac. Right now twin Japanese weeping cherries display their pink blooms. There is a large circular raised bed, bordered with stone, which contains a variety of perennials and a waterfall. Several garden sculptures, a bird bath, and a trellis covered with clematis add even more interest.

Mr. and Mrs. Hahn Nguyen, owners of 501 Carpathian, both avid gardeners, have won Yard of the Month before, some six or eight years ago. At that time, the circular flower bed was a Koi pond. But their fish died, not from the winter cold, since their pond was heated, but from the heavy blanket of snow one winter which cut off the oxygen supply. The Nguyens add inexpensive bagged topsoil from Lowe's to their flower beds. Although this product is usually heavy and wet, they say when spread and allowed to dry out it works fine. Rabbits do more damage than deer in their neighborhood. They spray liquid fence with fair success. Hard work and constant maintenance is the real secret to their great success!


