Minutes

Following the annual garden tour which approximately 30 people attended, members met at Kiwanis Park for lunch and a brief business meeting. Carolyn Doyle, Flower Show Chair, gave members a draft schedule for the Standard Flower Show which will be held at the Columbia Public Library on December 12. Carolyn also discussed plans for the club's 90th birthday celebration. The celebration will be at the Boone County Historical Society from 1 to 4 PM on Monday, July 13th. Bob McConnell will be the Master of Ceremonies. Marie Pasley is working on compiling a brief history of activities of the Columbia Garden Club but she said that is difficult because the club has been involved in so many ways in the City of Columbia's history. Carolyn announced that Claudia Chopp will present a program on "Design Through the Decades" for this special occasion. Carolyn asked for two volunteers to design two arrangements. A small arrangement is needed for the front desk, and a taller arrangement is needed for a pedestal. Contact Carolyn if you are interested in doing one of these designs. July Yard of the Month

Lorrie Craft of 1209 Weaver was so pleased to have her garden chosen as Yard of the Month for July! And no wonder! It makes a perfectly stunning curbside impression, with two enormous circles of pink impatiens set off by a small emerald green lawn and a backdrop of meticulously trimmed yew. There are a half dozen white concrete bird baths scattered about, several holding classic Greek statues. One bird bath, on the front porch, is a multi-leveled fountain featuring a lady with doves. Hanging containers hold very large and lush Boston ferns.

This homeowner is a lady of multiple talents. For example, she makes gorgeous living wreaths as a hobby and several are hanging in the garden. The wreaths are made of ordinary grapevine, to which she attaches plastic bags filled with soil. A lush combination of plants completely hide the soil and appear to be growing right out of each finished wreath.

Lorrie's special gift seems to be growing roses. She has the most beautiful, healthy looking Hybrid Tea roses to be seen anywhere in Columbia (where most people don't even try to raise these difficult varieties). She has 45 named varieties and can tell you the name of every one! Lorrie's secrets to success with Hybrid Teas: (1) Feeds Wal-Mart rose food every 6 weeks. (2) Sprays with Sevin insecticide and a separate rose fungicide at the same time. (3) hand waters each individual plant with a sprinkler hose early in the day whenever the ground looks dry. (4) Top dresses with top soil from Lowe's at the time of feeding. Does not use mulch. Note: Each rose plant or group of plants is in a raised bed about 6 to 8 inches high. When I asked if she planted them in raised beds, she said no, they are up high because of the gradual accumulation of added topsoil.

There are other shrubs and flowers in Lorrie's yard, all showing the results of loving care. It is amazing that she does all her own garden work except for occasional help with heavy lifting from her son. Congratulations, Lorrie!
