

Flower Show "Summer Vacation"

This is one of the club's main projects, and is one of the benchmarks for our club's success. Following are the design class titles, and for the unfamiliar classes, the rules from the Handbook for Flower Shows, 2007 revised. There is also information on Designs in the Oriental Manner from websites. Call Alice Havard 445-4624 to register your choice of design class for the show. We must fill all 24 openings, and there are great choices available. Also, the May meeting will be a workshop based on the design classes - please bring a design to work on based on one of the show classes. Barb Schuette and Carolyn Doyle will lead the workshop. It's a great way to try your creative ideas!



Section A: "Away We Go" Designer's Choice - all fresh, all dried, or a combination of plant material - (no artificial plant material allowed)

Beige backgrounds 32" wide and 36" high provided, and must be used. Depth of space is about 30". Drapery and/or underlay may be used.

ELIGIBLE FOR THE DESIGNER'S CHOICE AWARD

Class 1. "Vacation in the Orient" (A design in the manner of traditional oriental styles)

Class 2. "Vacation in the West"

Class 3 "Vacation at Grandma's and Grandpa's" (Novice designer's only - designer's who have never won a blue ribbon in a NGC Flower Show)

Section B: "Are We There Yet?" All plant material used in the design must be fresh (no artificial plant material allowed). No backgrounds provided. Height not restricted. Space is 32" wide and about 30" deep. Backgrounds (provided by designer) and or underlays allowed.

ELIGIBLE FOR THE TRICOLOR AWARD

Class 4. "Vacation at Niagara Falls" (An underwater design)

Class 5. "Vacation in New York City" (An Exhibition Table Type II)

Class 6. "Vacation in Ireland" A design in which green is the dominant color



ATTENTION...ATTENTION...ATTENTION...

Now that I have your attention... please read the information on pages 4 thru 6 as this information will be important for the May program and our flower show in June! Remember, we need you to participate in the flower show in some way as 50% member participation is one of the measurements for the high awards! We have great flower shows! And so much fun!

UNDERWATER DESIGN.

- A Creative Design having component/s, including some or all plant material, submerged in water to create interest. Those components under water must contribute artistically to the overall design and not merely be stems and/or mechanics.
 - a. If some components are in water and others are not, the effect must be that of a single overall design related by placement and components, not two independent designs. There is a rhythmic flow from components submerged in water to those not in water. Typically, those components not in water will be above those in water, but this is not a requirement.
 - b. If entire design is submerged within a container, a single overall design results, but the designer must also consider the Design Principle Proportion. The dimensions and form of the container must be in appropriate relationship to the frame of reference stated in the schedule.
- 2. Circular transparent container/s may provide the best effect, but are not required.
- 3. Components submerged in water are chosen for their lasting quality under water. Firm, hard-surfaced plant materials such as tropical flowers, foliage, evergreens, seed pods, and some vegetables and fruits will hold up well.
- 4. Water visually magnifies all things.
 - a. Underwater components will appear larger.
 - b. Mechanics and debris are also magnified. This must be considered when planning design and working with plant material.
- 5. Water line becomes part of design, and is distracting if poorly situated.
- 6. Water may not be colored if any part of fresh plant material is submerged.


YARD OF THE MONTH

If you see a pretty yard that looks like the resident is doing their own work and that is deserving of CGC's Yard of the Month, please let Emily Bonwich or Carolyn Swope know. They will go by to see it, talk to the person living there and make the decision as to who deserves the award. We have two signs so could have two each month if we find two yards that qualify. At a house auction recently, one of the selling points was that it had won the vard of the month award from CGC! A proud moment.

<u>Design "in the Oriental Manner"</u> is the design in Section A: class 1. This is really a fun design that uses less plant material and is so fun. Here is a good website to see the different types of designs.

More than simply putting flowers in a container, ikebana is a disciplined art form in which nature and humanity are brought together. Contrary to the idea of floral



Another aspect present in ikebana is its employment of <u>minimalism</u>. That is, an arrangement may consist of only a minimal number of blooms interspersed among stalks and leaves. The structure of a Japanese flower arrangement is based on a<u>scalene triangle</u> delineated by three main points, usually twigs, consid-


ered in some schools to symbolize <u>heaven</u>, <u>earth</u>, and<u>man</u> and in others <u>sun</u>, <u>moon</u>, and <u>earth</u>. The container is a key element of the composition, and various styles of pottery may be used in their construction.

If you are planning to enter a table or if you just want to practice, please bring whatever you think you would use in a table design. If you do not understand what you would use, you know vou will need some sort of plate or whatever you plan to eat from and something related to the description, in this case, New York City. Hopefully you will get ideas to help you pull a design together! Try it. It is so fun! Call Alice if you have questions about the program.

C. Exhibition.

- 1. An artistic arrangement of table components, within an allotted space, to provide a creative effect without consideration for functional placement. All components chosen must be suitable for use on a dining table.
- 2. Schedule may not specify table components or their numbers, but exhibit should include components appropriate to manner of dining, class title and/or occasion.
- 3. Exhibition Tables may be:
 - a. Type I. Must include a decorative unit/s. These designs are judged by the scale of points for Exhibition Tables, Type I.
 - h. Type II. May not include a decorative unit/s, but must include some plant material placed where needed to carry rhythm, repeat color/s and overall degree of formality. Such designs are judged by the same scale of points as for non-table designs. See p. 303, #1.
 - 1) Container/s, or items substituting for containers, may be used, but they must not provide the receptacle for a completed design.
 - 2) All plants, including container-grown plants, are not designs and therefore may be used.
 - 3) For Type I or Type II, if eligible for the Table Artistry or Designer's Choice Award, schedule may not state how any required staging props are to be used.
- 4. Within each class, schedule must specify Type I or Type II, as they are judged by different scales of points.

QUEEN ANNE'S LACE JELLY (WHITE FLOWERS)

3 1/2 CUPS WATER 15 LARGE QUEEN ANNE'S LACE FLOWER HEADS

3 3/4 CUPS SUGAR SURE JEL

Bring to a rolling boil 3 1/2 cups water.

Take off heat and add 15 large flower heads to make a strong tea (cover and set aside for 20 minutes. Strain to make 3 cups of tea.)

Follow the Sure Jel type of jelly using 3 3/4 cups of sugar for this recipe.

Makes 4-5 cups of jelly.

This tea when strained will be green & then turn to light green brown when Sure-Jel and sugar are added and will turn to light brown pink when finished. The has a delicate flavor not unlike quince and is particularly delicious with chicken.


and we appreciate you so much!
