February 11, 2008

The meeting was called to order at 2:20 p.m. following a program on "Arthritis, Gardening and other Exercise". Kyle Gibson from the University of Missouri - Department of Physical Therapy, presented the program.

For roll call, members shared what physical activities they would do to strengthen their bodies for the gardening season. Thirteen members attended the meeting. This year, flats will be purchased at a minimal cost from the Amish community at Clark. We discussed purchasing red shirts to wear at the sale. A sheet was passed for volunteers to sign their names to help. President Linda was agreed to serve as one of our delegates to the convention.
